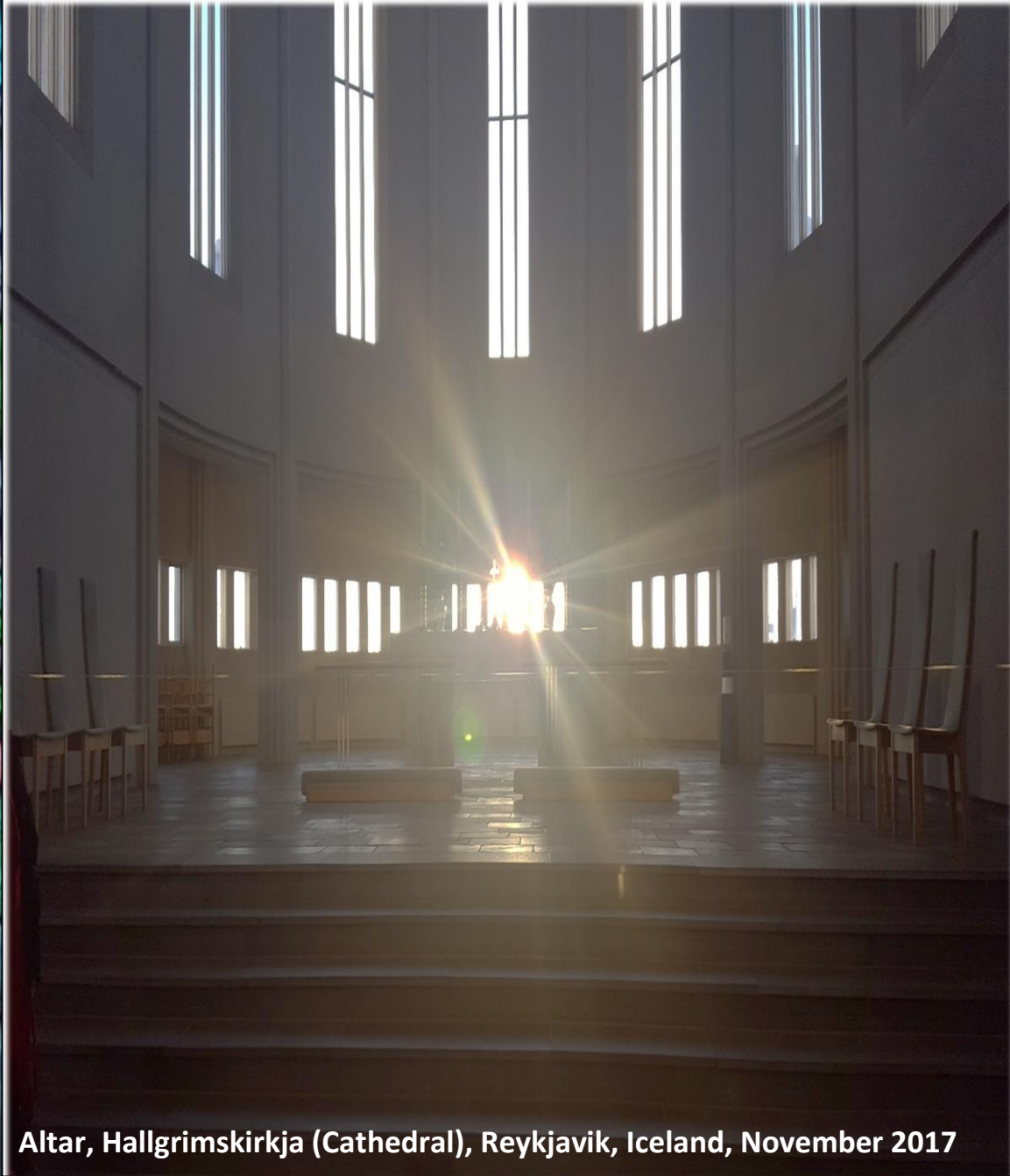

From the Editor..... June 2021

What does 'Church' mean to you?

As we look forward to the possibility of meeting for worship in church once more, many of have been asked to reflect on the questions 'What is church?' and 'What is 'church' for?' There has been much talk, in particular, about how far we can and should be 'church' without a building in which to meet in person and in a world where people increasingly 'meet' online in various ways. And I have to acknowledge that meeting online offers opportunities that in-person events can't offer, like the chance to meet and study with people from all over the regions, the country and even from abroad -all in the comfort of your own home.

The meaning of 'church' in the New Testament is a group of people drawn together because of their commitment to follow Jesus. The early church people met to pray, learn, discuss their faith, support one another and remember Jesus' sacrifice through communion (bread and wine). Acts 2:42 says that Jesus' followers "devoted themselves to teaching and fellowship" and Acts 2:46 says they "spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and are their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people". It strikes me that, during lockdown, we have been like these early church folk, even though much of our activity has been digital (Zoom worship, meetings, Bible study) or distanced (Space at the Table meals).

But the one thing we have missed is "spending time together in the Temple' (our church building) and 'the breaking of bread' (in the sense of Communion). Whatever people say about digital services, drinking juice and nibbling a cracker while sitting alone at a computer screen is NOT the same experience as taking Communion in our church building with members of our church fellowship!

Yes, ‘the church is wherever God’s people are praising’ (R&S 583), but let’s give thanks for our building, for all the memories it holds of dear friends and loved ones, baptisms, marriages, funerals, beloved preachers and the special services it has been such a privilege to be part of; for all the communities for whom our building provides a home, and especially for our beautiful, special worship space that allows us to meet together in fellowship and friendship in the presence of God

Thanks to the generosity of the kind people of Wilbraham St Ninian's and the Metropolitan Congregation who met people's travel expenses, a Covid vaccination clinic was organised at Whalley Range cricket club for our LGBT Asylum seekers on Tuesday 25th May. **Bethan Galliers** from Levenshulme Inspire organised the clinic, and **Philip Jones** from the Metropolitan Congregation organised and helped people get to and from the clinic.

The Elders have agreed to have a phased opening up of church starting on Sunday 4th July (national and local rules permitting). Elders and Managers are producing an up-to-date Risk Assessment so that we will be all set to go.

We will need your help to supervise Covid safety procedures, e.g., taking details for Track and Trace, helping with hand sanitiser and explaining Covid safety measures.

You will be contacted soon to ask you to complete a short questionnaire to help us to move forward with our plans.

We anticipate that when we first meet, we will have a short period of worship followed by a small socially-distanced celebration. A Communion service will follow soon after.

If you have missed a celebration during the lockdown period (e.g., wedding anniversary, significant birthday, please let me or Kath know so that we can celebrate your 'occasion' at the re-opening service).
